Welcome

The meeting was called to order at 9:04 a.m.

Approval of Minutes

MOTION: Shavloske/Lochrie. A motion was made to amend the May 24, 2019 Walk of Fame Committee minutes to the first version that was circulated minutes. Passed unanimously.

Discussion of Award Criteria

The Committee discussed the current award criteria. Chair Sonya Burrows emphasized the importance of people making an impact outside of their “respective fields.” Lillian Small questioned the “lifelong” component of the criteria. Patrick Shavloske spoke about how people can make a tremendous impact living in the community even if they only live here for a brief period of time. Denise Cunningham suggested removing “lifelong” from the award criteria. Robert Lochrie, III suggested that the criteria should be a sustained contribution and impact on the City of Fort Lauderdale. Shavloske mentioned adding criteria about bringing notoriety or fame to Fort Lauderdale due to the award’s Walk of Fame title. Lochrie suggested changing “lifelong” on the award application to “sustained impact.” The Committee agreed.

Chaz Adams gave the committee an overview about the Citizen Recognition Awards and spoke about the history of the Walk of Fame and the committee.

Chair Burrows suggested having the homeowner and civic associations submit Walk of Fame nominations since it would generate exposure for the award program. Lochrie supported the idea. Small discussed a vetting process for the nominees. Lochrie suggested that Burrows reach out to the homeowner and civic associations via email to

get nominations. Adams suggested that an announcement could be made at the next Council of Civic Associations meeting.

The Committee discussed how they do not want to accept incomplete applications or ones submitted with only attachments. Shavloske suggested that nominations should be resubmitted each year. The Committee agreed that nominations should be resubmitted and to not have any carryovers to subsequent years.

The Committee also discussed moving the award application deadline to January, meeting to discuss applications in February, and having subsequent meetings if further discussion is needed.

George Hanbury II asked if the committee members could nominate someone but abstain from voting. The Committee agreed.

Lochrie questioned how many awards the committee should give out annually. Hanbury suggested setting a maximum number so as not to diminish the award's significance. The Committee agreed to a maximum of four honorees per year with families being treated as one honoree.

A discussion was held regarding the 2019 Walk of Fame nominees the committee had previously sent forward to the City Commission. Adams explained that the agenda item got pulled and was placed on hold. Adams also explained how the City Commission directed the Committee of Citizens' Recognition to narrow down their nominations for one category since two people were nominated. The Committee agreed that they would like the City Commission to approve the 2019 Walk of Fame nominations or provide feedback. Adams discussed the importance of the Committee Chair and/or other members attending the City Commission meeting when the item is scheduled.

MOTION: Shavloske/Small. A motion was made to change the award criteria to read: Walk of Fame Honorees are recognized by making sustained, positive impacts in one or more of the areas listed below but not limited to:

- Providing a positive outlook for the future of our youth,
- Contributing to the quality of life for our citizens,
- Fostering the spirit of our community,
- Bringing positive recognition to the City, locally or nationally,
- Making the City of Fort Lauderdale a place to live, work, or play,
- Encouraging people to visit the City of Fort Lauderdale as a destination of choice.

Passed unanimously.

MOTION: Shavloske/Hanbury. A motion was made to ratify the 2019 Walk of Fame selections previously made and recommend the City Commission recognize them as 2019 Walk of Fame honorees. Passed unanimously.

MOTION: Shavloske/Small. A motion was made to limit the nominees to a maximum of four per year. Passed unanimously.

MOTION: Shavloske/Cunningham. A motion was made to not accept incomplete Walk of Fame applications and to not allow carryovers of any applications to future years. Passed unanimously.

MOTION: Hanbury/Cunningham. A motion was made to set all the motions from the May 24, 2019 Walk of Fame Committee meeting as the bylaws for future committees. Passed unanimously.

MOTION: Shavloske/Small. A motion was made to set the 2020 Walk of Fame application deadline to Monday, January 13. The Committee will meet in February to discuss nominations and have subsequent meetings if needed. Nominees will be selected by April 1, 2010. Passed 5-1-0 (Lochrie absent.)

MOTION: Small/Shavloske. A motion was made to adjourn at 10:14 a.m. Passed unanimously.

I am nominating Fort Lauderdale Pioneer Sylvia Aldridge for the 2020 Walk of Fame Honoree

Sylvia Aldridge was one of the first black settlers in Fort Lauderdale arriving here in 1904. She and her husband, Anderson, in 1908, were the parents of the first black baby, named George, born in the city.

Sylvia Aldridge had the first employment agency in the city. Founded to provide jobs for blacks cleaning the homes of affluent white residents. She then founded Sylvia's Victory Cabs to see that the workers could get to work on time.

During the Depression, Sylvia would not be concerned about the rent being paid on property that she owned. She also always had soup on her stove to feed those in need.

In 1936, when a farm labor truck overturned in north Broward. Several workers were killed, many others were injured. The wounded were laid out on the grass in front of Memorial Hospital, on East Broward Boulevard. They could not be taken inside because they were black. There, moving among them on the lawn, washing and tending to them as best she could, was Sylvia Aldridge. The incident convinced her and others that a black hospital was needed. Until that time, surgery was performed by Dr. James Sistrunk in his office. The hospital rooms were just plain rooms in the back of the building. Aldridge became a leader in the fundraising drive that two years later led to the building of Provident Hospital. Provident served the black community until public hospitals were desegregated in the 1960's.

Sylvia Aldridge was founding president of the Dillard High School PTA and remained active for 25 years. In 1947, she helped underwrite the school's first band. In March, 1958, Sylvia Aldridge was named, "Woman of the Year" by Zeta Phi Beta. Sylvia was presented the award for, "Her outstanding services in religions and civic work and exemplary qualities of finer womanhood".

Her activities in the community were matched by those in her church. A devout member of St. John's United Methodist Church, Sylvia Aldridge donated land for a sanctuary. As well, she was a trustee and benefactor for Bethune-Cookman College in Daytona Beach, and active in local community activities, such as the Northwest Federated Women's Club, the American Woodsman, the Eastern Star, Heroines of Jericho, and the Grand United Order of Pallbearers. She also was an active worker for both Community Chest and the March of Dimes.

The United States Post Office Branch at 400 Northwest 7th Avenue, Fort Lauderdale, is named in Sylvia Aldridge's honor.

2. Why is the nominee deserving of this award?

I believe Sylvia Aldridge is deserving of this award for her outstanding community service. Imagine a woman in the early 1900's accomplishing so much in the way of being a business entrepreneur, then add that Sylvia was a black woman! It just speaks to me to contemplate it! I decided to nominate Sylvia Aldridge when I learned of her accomplishments. A woman who did so much for the black community, who strived to find blacks jobs, provided transportation, all of this in the segregated south. The Aldridge's son, George, was found shot and killed and the murder was never solved. Again, it boggles my mind to think of her. She was a strong woman! Then you add to the list, all the community things that she did, helping to secure the Provident Hospital, founding the PTA at Dillard High School, all the great things that she did for the community. Sylvia Aldridge would not have been allowed to swim at Fort Lauderdale Beach. I think it's fitting for such a fine person as she was, in this time and place, that we FOREVER give her a spot at our beach to honor her memory and all that she had accomplished. I am honored to nominate Sylvia Aldridge for the Walk of Fame marker and award. May the marker inspire us all to learn about and honor another of our great pioneers while also inspiring us to serve the community as they all did!

Biography of Sylvia (Hill) Aldridge

Born: November 18, 1884 Died: November 12, 1962

Sylvia Hill Aldridge was born November 18, 1884, just North of Gainesville. Sylvia Hill was the 6th of eleven children to a family that was unusually affluent for that time and place. Her parents owned eighteen hundred acres that had been given to Hill forebears by their former slave owners once they were freed after the Civil War. In 1904 she married Anderson Aldridge. Shortly afterwards they moved to the new settlement of Fort Lauderdale. At that time, the black community consisted of seven homes and two stores.

Sylvia Aldridge began work cleaning the homes of affluent white residents. She saw there were plenty of such jobs to be had. She also saw a lot of black folks either didn't know how to go about getting these jobs, or they were intimidated, afraid of dealing directly with white people. This gave her the idea for her first business Sylvia's Employment Agency.

She quit her own job as a maid and began finding work for her neighbors, right out of her home, at 301 Northwest Second Street. It was the city's first such business and for many years it was the only agency for domestic help.

Aldridge was a born entrepreneur. When she realized her employees needed a way to get to work, she started Sylvia's Victory Cabs making certain everyone arrived at their jobs on time.

A niece, Ollie Irving, recalled the day her aunt came home with twenty sparkling white uniforms. She put them in the bathroom, then, one by one, as women came to ask about work, she'd send the prospective workers into the bathroom to find a uniform that fit and get ready to work.

She had rules, too, and was very strict about them. Clients were told that if one of her housekeepers did not meet their approval, they were to immediately call Mrs. Aldridge. "She trained the women, you see. She taught them how to keep a family house properly. How to polish mirrors, how to properly make the beds, aunt Sylvia taught them everything they needed to know in order to keep the client happy and keep the job."

Irving says her aunt and uncle also ran a small restaurant from the side of their house. They also owned property that they rented out. All of this created a good living for Aldridge and her family, and she was a generous woman. During the Depression she was known for ignoring rent deadlines and for feeding anyone who needed a meal from a huge soup kettle on her kitchen stove.

Edna Way, another early settler, recalled coming to town and being impressed by the lady Aldridge. "I first came here to teach one year. When I stayed to teach summer school, they had cut it down to one teacher and I didn't have a job. I found Mrs. Sylvia Aldridge. She was active in the Methodist Church, and she was concerned about everyone's welfare. She would just put a finger on a person, no matter who came. She knew people so well in that she always sent the right person to the job. I thought that was so remarkable. And so generous! You never knew of her charging someone for getting them a job." Another Aldridge distinction. The couple's son George, born in 1908, was the first black baby born in Fort Lauderdale, according to records filed with the Fort Lauderdale Historical Society and the Black Historical Society. Tragically, later in life, George Aldridge was found shot and killed, the murder was never solved.

One pivotal day in Aldridge's life came in 1936, when a farm labor truck overturned in north Broward. Several workers were killed, many others were injured. The wounded were laid out on the grass in front of Memorial Hospital, on East Broward Boulevard. They could not be taken inside and treated because they were black.

There, moving among them on the lawn, washing and tending to them as best she could, was Sylvia Aldridge. The incident convinced her and others that a black hospital was needed. Until that time, surgery was performed by Dr. James Sistrunk in his office. The hospital rooms were just plain rooms in the back of the building. Aldridge became a leader in the fundraising drive that two years later led to the building of Provident Hospital. Provident served the black community until public hospitals were desegregated in the 1960's.

Aldridge's generosity knew no bounds. In 1939 she took in an orphaned thirteen-month old baby boy named Reuben. Much beloved by the Aldridge's, Reuben was a good student at Dillard High School and went on to graduate from Howard University in Washington, D.C.

Anderson Aldridge died in November 1953, Sylvia Aldridge carried on in the businesses without him until she fell in her backyard in 1961 and fractured her hip. At seventy-seven, she never regained her health. She was in and out of the hospital until she died of a heart attack in 1962. According to her doctor, Von D. Mizell, she died with her son Reuben on her mind. "The day she died all she could do was talk about him." The physician recalled.

Her activities in the community were matched by those in her church. A devout member of St. John's United Methodist Church, Sylvia Aldridge donated land for a sanctuary. As well, she was a trustee and benefactor for Bethune-Cookman College in Daytona Beach, and active in local community activities, such as the Northwest Federated Women's Club, the American Woodsman, the Eastern Star, Heroines of Jericho, and the Grand United Order of Pallbearers. She also was an active worker for both Community Chest and the March of Dimes. She was founding president of the Dillard High School PTA and remained active for 25 years. In 1947, she helped underwrite the school's first band.

In March, 1958, Sylvia Aldridge was named, "Woman of the Year" by Zeta Phi Beta. Sylvia was presented the award for, "Her outstanding services in religious and civic work and exemplary qualities of finer womanhood."

Her funeral drew residents from both black and white communities, with all remembering Aldridge as a good Samaritan. Two ministers spoke and the Dillard choral ensemble sang. The four-page program with a large picture of her on the cover, eulogized her as, “pleasant toward everyone, a loveable character, a humanitarian in stature.” She was eulogized with the words, “There was not a worthwhile project or civic organization in the community that she was not identified with in one way or another”, More than a few smiled when recalling her trademark response when asked to take on some task. “Baby I’ll get right on it.”

Sylvia Aldridge was laid to rest in Historic Woodlawn Cemetery.

After her death, niece Ollie Irving who cared for Aldridge during her illness, inherited her aunt’s northwest Fort Lauderdale home. She lived there and made her living by selling fruit from the back of her station wagon until a fire destroyed the house in 1979.

She recalls how the city stopped her from repairing the house, since it stood in a targeted redevelopment zone. The city was clearing out old structures to make way for new homes and apartments.

Irving stood in the way of the demolition, refusing the city’s purchase price of \$13,570. She wanted the fire-gutted, crumbling house—part of which was said to be at least seventy-three years old—to be preserved as a historic landmark, to memorialize the contributions made to the community. After all, Irving said, Anderson and Sylvia Aldridge were among the first black families to settle in Fort Lauderdale, their son the first black child to be born in the city. “I wanted something to stand, to represent Sylvia Aldridge down through the years.” Unfortunately, vagrants began hiding in what remained of the structure. Garbage was dumped in the backyard near the mango trees. The city began condemnation proceedings and the structure was demolished.

Members of the Black Historical Society of Broward County agreed that the house had historical meaning and wished the house could have been preserved. “Sylvia Aldridge was an angel who was always handing out something to someone”, said Elizabeth Williams, who was a member of the Historical Society, “We wanted to do something about the house, but then it burned down beyond repair.”

Indeed, said Mary Smith, who founded the Historical Society, “We don’t have landmarks in the northwest section that we can say remind us of our past.”

While the Aldridge home no longer exists. A United States Post Office Branch at 400 Northwest 7th Avenue, Fort Lauderdale, Florida, serves not only the African-American community, but the entire city. The branch is located not far from Sylvia’s home, and is named in her honor. The post office was opened in 1998.

An observation of my own doing this biography, all of the early news stories about Sylvia Aldridge had her name spelled incorrectly. Notice in the clippings I have attached to this 2020 Walk of Fame Honoree Nomination Form. Her name is misspelled. It is “Sylvia Alrdige” or “Silvia Alrige”. I doubt if the newspaper in that day and time, would have been so careless writing about a white citizen.

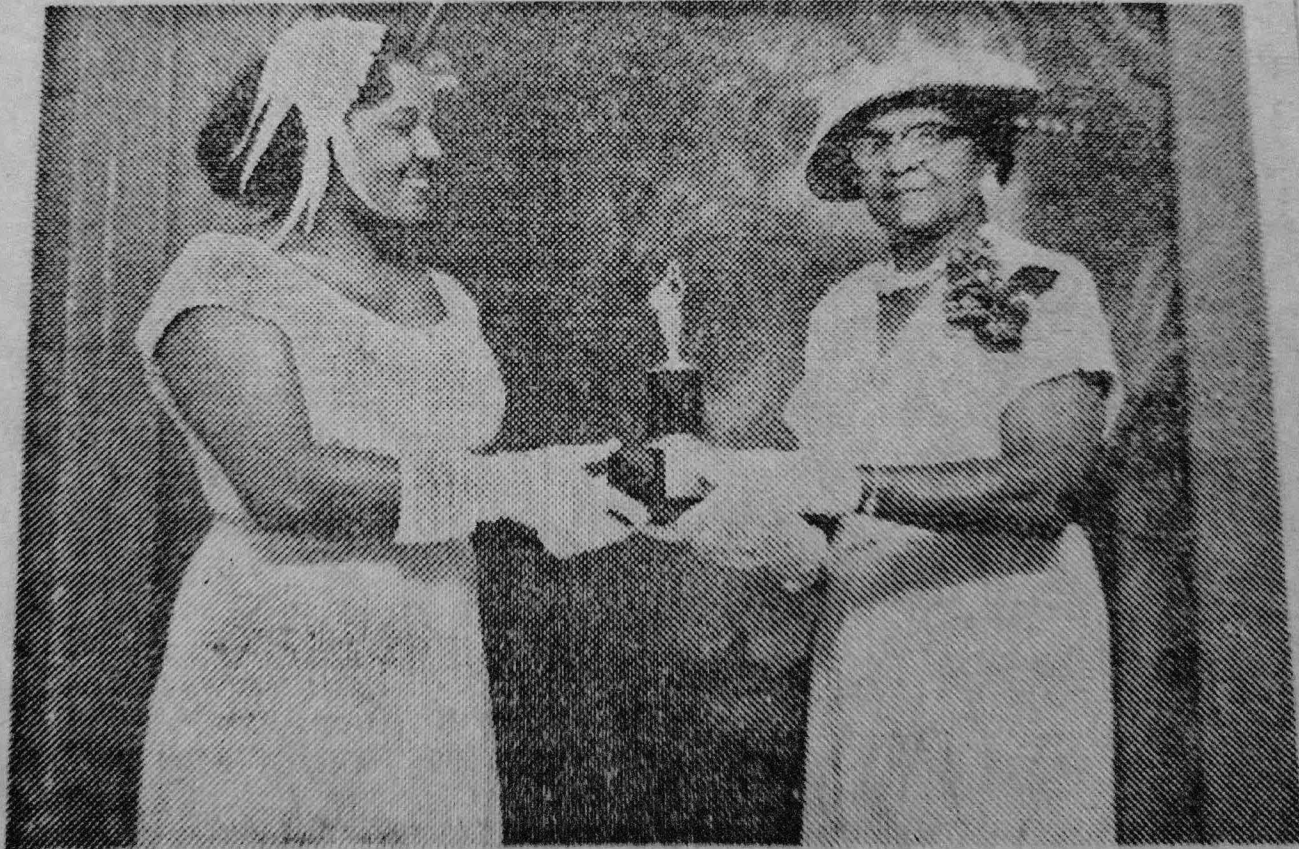

SYLVIA ALRIDGE, A FORT LAUDERDALE VISIONARY

Sylvia Alridge arrived in Fort Lauderdale before it had been incorporated as a city. The year was 1904. She was young, newly married and optimistic.

Sylvia found work right away. In her first job, she worked as a domestic. However, as she observed events in this rapidly developing community, she also saw opportunity. Sylvia recognized the need to match people who needed help with people who needed jobs. She therefore founded Sylvia's Employment Service, the first employment agency in town. Once Sylvia matched people to positions, she also saw the need to provide safe, dependable transportation for her clients. So Sylvia founded the Victory Cab Service.

Besides her visionary business sense, Sylvia Alridge also attacked the social problems around her. In 1936, a tragic farm accident left many injured farm workers lying outside the only hospital in town, denied health care because of their race. Sylvia joined forces with Dr. Sistrunk and led the fund raising efforts that resulted in the opening of Provident Hospital, the first such local institution to serve the African America community.

Sylvia is remembered for her practical approach to life and her humanitarian concern for her neighbors. She saw many ways to make a difference in her world and acted upon them. She founded the first employment service, a pioneering taxi service and helped to found a hospital.. Not bad for the daughter of a slave.



Black History Celebrates . . . Black History

"I knew a man, Bojangles
and he danced for you
In worn out shoes.
With silver hair, a ragged shirt,
and baggy pants
The old soft shoe.
He jumped so high,
he jumped so high
Then he'd lightly touch down
Mr. Bojangles, Mr. Bojangles,
Mr. Bojangles . . . Dance."

When we hear that hauntingly beautiful, sprightly song, "Mr. Bojangles," it usually brings to mind a kindly Black man that was usually drunk, danced for those at county fairs throughout the South and spent a lot of time — behind these country bars, "Cause I drinks a bit."

That "Mr. Bojangles" is a fictitious person — the fact of the matter is that the "real" Bojangles was a self-made multi-millionaire that was known as the worlds greatest tap dancer. In a 1934 profile of Bill "Bojangles" Robinson in the New Yorker Magazine, he was described as " . . . a philanthropist of note . . . No charity movement is attempted today without Robinson's support. A beautiful performance without him would be like a Milk Fund affair without Mrs. Randolph Hearst," the article noted.

February is Black History Month and it's a time when contributions of Afro-Americans are recounted and festivals such as our own 12th Annual Sistrunk Historical Festival helps recognize people and events. Actually, the Sistrunk Historical Festival is a celebration of African, African-America and Caribbean Cultures. February 1st starts the month of activities with a parade and everyone loves a parade. The route will go from 441 and Sunrise Blvd. down to NW 27th Avenue and North onto Sistrunk Blvd. to NW 15th Avenue.

This year's festival theme is "They Came Before Columbus: The African Presence in the Americas." More than thirty events including exhibits, demonstrations, and the First Annual Black Theater Festival of South Florida will be offered to the public. Most events are free. Sylvia Aldridge . . . A Great Humanitarian

Sylvia Hill was born on November 18, 1884, near Brooker, Florida, just north of Gainesville. She was the sixth of 11 children for Mr. and Mrs. Mitchell Hill. Her family was rather affluent, owning 1,800 acres of land that had been given to Hill's forebears when they were freed after the Civil War.

She married Anderson Aldridge in 1904 and moved to Fort Lauderdale where the Black community had a total of 7 homes and two stores. At first, she worked as a domestic. Recognizing there was a growing need for such work and also realizing that many Blacks did not know how to go about getting work, she started Sylvia's Employment Agency. For those readers who remember the 'old days,' Sylvia was quite famous and almost anyone that was seeking domestic help called Sylvia. Her business prospered and later she started Sylvia's Victory Cabs to drive many of her clients to work. She owned several rental buildings.

Although she made a good living, it was a well known fact that she could have been much wealthier, but she was generous to a point of being "a soft touch". She would not press for employment fees or rent, if she felt that the debtor was in a bind. During the Depression, she ignored rent deadlines and fed anyone who needed a meal from a giant soup kettle on her kitchen stove.

A remarkable event happened in 1936 when a farm-labor truck overturned in North Broward. Three or four of the workmen were killed and many others were injured. The injured were laid out on the lawn in front of what was then Memorial Hospital on E. Broward Blvd. Since they were Black, they couldn't be treated at the hospital. So, there was Sylvia, moving among them, washing them and tending them as best she could.

The incident helped convince her and many others that a Black hospital was needed. At that time, surgery on Blacks was performed in Dr. James Sistrunk's office and the "hospital rooms" were just plain rooms in the back of the building. As the leader in a fund raising effort, Mrs. Aldridge helped make Providence Hospital a reality which served the Black community until public hospitals were desegregated in the 1960's.

After a life of good works, she died of a heart attack on November 12, 1961. At her funeral a four-page program, with a large picture of her on the cover, eulogized her as "pious and toward everyone, a lovable character, a humanitarian in nature." When Mrs. Aldridge is remembered, in the White community as well as the Black, it is with warmth. Phrases such as "Good Samaritan", "good Christian person", "always wanted to help" and "very dedicated" occur. One of her greatest contributions was that she probably provided more people with jobs than any other individual. □

The reception committee visited the better home in the negro section that of Mamie Jackson on Cumberland avenue. The committee was more than pleased to have this particular home for one of its demonstration homes, for it was planned and built as a result of Peter Hodge's demonstration in Fort Lauderdale last year, and is without doubt, a credit to the committee who had charge of the 1925 campaign. It is cozy, comfortable, convenient, and immaculate in the last degree. The home has a long porch on the east end and on entering one finds himself in a neat and well-furnished hall or reception room, on each side of which is a well-appointed bedroom. West of the hall is the dining-room furnished with a fine painted breakfast set. The African night well put in charge most of this housekeeper's white employees' kitchen. Everything was spotless itself.

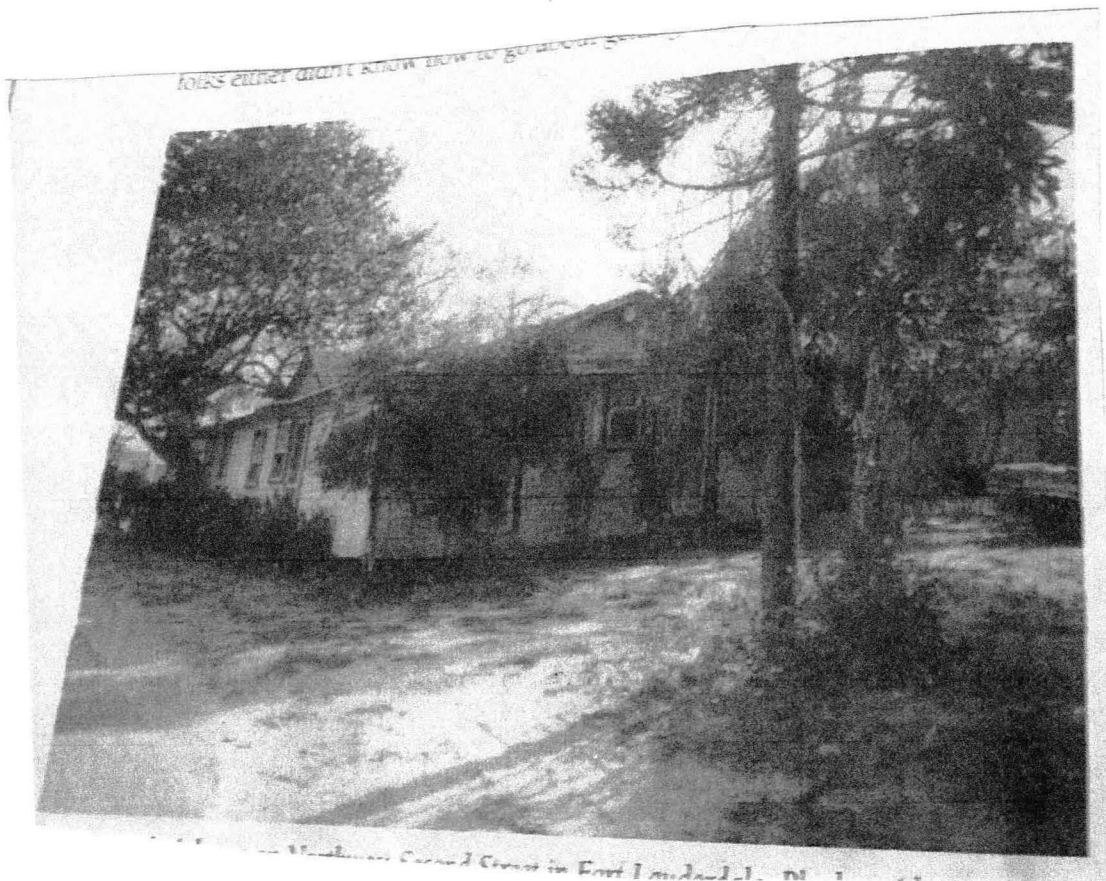

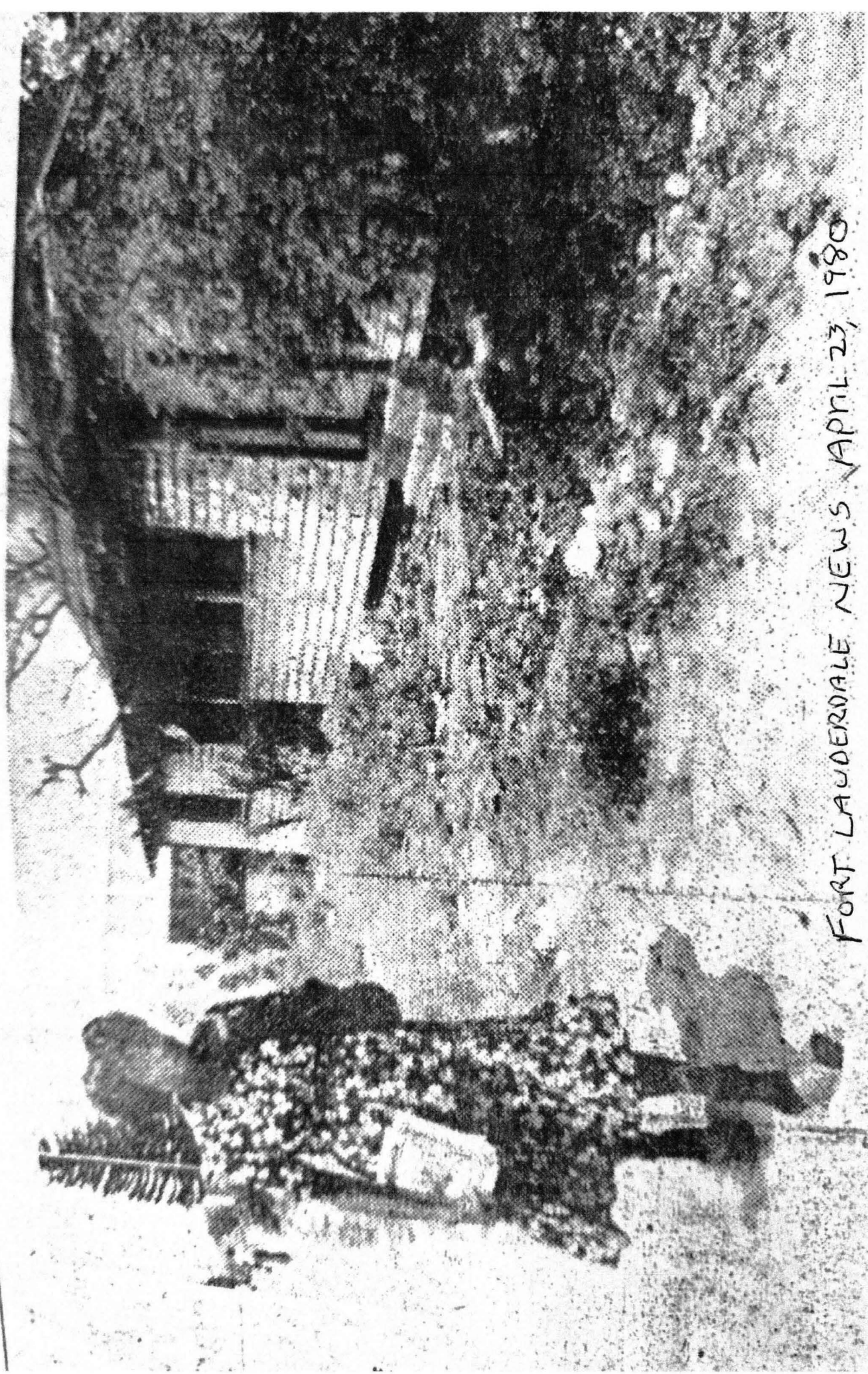

After his military service, he graduated from Murray State University in Murray, Kentucky, in 1970 with a bachelor ' s degree in both sociology and health and physical education. He received his master ' s degree at Florida Atlantic University. He was also a

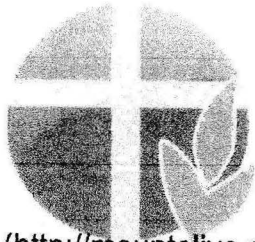

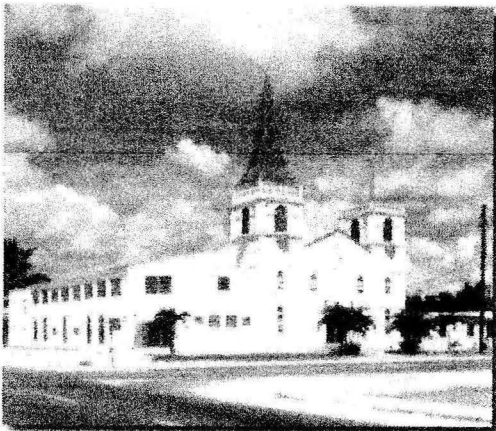

CHURCH HISTORY



The Church that we now know as New Mount Olive Baptist Church had its most humble beginning November 25, 1918.

In 1923, under the leadership of Reverend H.P. Bragdon, the name of the church was changed to New Mount Olive Baptist Church. Then they decided to build a new Church. Reverend Bragdon and Sister Mary Liza Williams, one of our first members, selected a suitable site on the corner of Fourth Street and Ninth Avenue. In 1925, a small wooden structure was built.

The membership increased rapidly for the next four years, and their faith and perseverance were quite evident as the membership rebuilt churches that were destroyed by the 1926 and 1928 hurricanes. In

1929, the permanent building was completed and the congregation moved in early in September. When Reverend Bragdon ended his pastorate in 1930, there was a completed church building and a membership of more than 500.

Reverend O.W. Wells was called in 1937, and another tremendous growth in membership, size and prestige was recorded. Under his pastorate, a new and bigger church was built.

The Missionary Society, organized July 27, 1939, with Sister Rosa Lewis as president, grew from its original twelve into a group of eleven circles boasting more than 112 members. The church structure was completed. Counted among the many physical improvements was the completion of the remodeling and furnishing of the church kitchen and dining room in February, 1960. By August 31, 1960, the membership had increased to approximately 1,700.

In March of 1962, the Reverend G.E. Weaver was called to assume the responsibility of leadership at Mount Olive. Under his administration, the Church grew spiritually, numerically and structurally. The old church was improved by the addition of a new wing with eighteen classrooms and seating space in the Sanctuary for an additional 200

people.

For a decade (2010-2020), Mary Anne Gray served as President and Executive Director of Broward Navy Days, Inc., the local organization that produces the annual Fleet Week Port Everglades and which would have celebrated its 30th anniversary last year. During that time, Mary Anne and her organization welcomed nearly 100 Navy and Coast Guard vessels to the port and 25,000 visiting Sailors, Marines and Coast Guardsmen to our city. She expanded Fleet Week into more than a celebration of our men and women in uniform, but also an opportunity for our city and county to showcase its industries and diverse communities with new events like an annual Technology Summit, the Salute to Women, and expanded outreach to youth, veterans, and the maritime and hospitality sectors. When budget sequestration diverted Navy ships several years ago, Mary Anne pivoted with a "Fleetless Fleet Week" that honored the thousands of unsung active duty military who live and work right here, including the Coast Guard Station Fort Lauderdale crew and USCG District 7. More than 20 local civic partners with hundreds of volunteers mobilize each year to make Fleet Week Port Everglades a special port call and our host community is one of the most highly-regarded Fleet Weeks in the nation, regularly receiving the enthusiastic support of the Chief of Naval Operations in Washington, DC, and commander of the Atlantic Fleet in Norfolk.

9. Why is the nominee deserving of this award?

Mary Anne Gray has been a pioneer among women in the maritime industry for decades. In the early 1990s, she was the first woman elected as a commissioner for Port Everglades and then, chair. She was, at the time, one of the first women in the country to lead a major port. In the years following Broward County's assumption of governance of Port Everglades, she founded and led the local Manatee Survival Foundation, a statewide effort at a time when the population was at a critical level, especially due to boating accidents. She collaborated closely with industry and local and county governments to address this issue through public awareness, rescue services for injured manatees, and safety measures. As executive director of Broward Navy Days and the visionary for a post-Air and Sea Show Fleet Week, she created the Salute to Women event, which connected local women students with an interest in maritime with mentors in the military, and the Fleet Week Tech Summit, which connected many young female sailors with local technology entrepreneurs and executives. As the Navy and Coast Guard made great strides in promoting women to command and the admiralty, Mary Anne was a perfect ambassador and in many cases became a close friend to these rising officers. Mary Anne was an active mentor to young girls in the Women of Tomorrow organization and a leader of the South Florida chapter of Women's International Shipping and Maritime Association. Broward County and Fort Lauderdale are better today because of Mary Anne's dedication. Hers is a legacy for our city to celebrate for generations to come.

Marty Hendrick is a Level 4 USMS Certified Coach (one of the first 14 in USMS.) Michael "Mike" Hurst was – and still is - internationally recognized as a foodservice and hospitality "legend" as well as a passionate promoter of education in the Hospitality Industry. He has been described as a **"dynamic leader who inspired young people, championed education, and brought excitement to the restaurant industry during a 50-year career"** (Restaurant Business magazine, May 2001) and as a **"tireless crusader; always working to create and strengthen educational opportunities in the restaurant and foodservice industry"** (FIU Scholars Endowment Program). During his tenure as President of the National Restaurant Association, Mike brought back the iconic "We're Glad You're Here" starting a national adoption of the simple, but ultimate symbol of hospitality.

In addition to owning and operating the 15th Street Fisheries from inception (1979) until the day that he died (March 2001), he was a founding partner, owner, and operator of Marina Bay Hotel (floating houseboats on the New River) and Club as well as the New River Storehouse restaurant; was a founding faculty member of the Florida International University (FIU) Chaplin School of Hospitality and Tourism Management (teaching there for 27 years); a Director and Past President of the National Restaurant Association (NRA membership includes >800,000 restaurant and foodservice outlets) and NRA Educational Foundation; and founding member of the Broward County Tourist Development Council (TDC), to name just a few of the industry, education and community positions he held during his lifetime. He was married for over 45 years and a father of five children.

His sustained, positive impact on the Fort Lauderdale community as well as the foodservice and hospitality industry overall is evidenced not only during his lifetime, but also as his legacy continues some twenty years after his death. In a tribute, written by the (then) Dean of FIU Chaplin School in 2001, Anthony (Tony) Marshall, published in the March 2001 Hospitality Review magazine, sums up Mike's contributions to the industry that he loved so dearly, and captures the 'essence' of Mike's personality that was so innate to his success:

"While fame has eluded most people I know. Hurst was the exception: everyone in the food service industry knew him.... Hurst was a man of many faces: He was a full-time professor at the school, manager of his Fort Lauderdale businesses, and, later, a popular industry speaker around the world. He was happiest surrounded by a swirl of "busy- ness." He laughed at 14-hour work-days. Truth was, he loved being a man of crammed schedules."

Positive Outlook for the Future of our / Sustained Contributions to Education

Mike believed strongly in youth programs, particularly education – of any kind. At the national level, Mike was instrumental in establishing the NRA Educational Foundation (NRAEF). The NRAEF is the philanthropic foundation of the National Restaurant Association, and 'exists to enhance the restaurant industry's service to the public through education, community engagement and promotion of career opportunities.'

Even more importantly, Mike was a founder and strong advocate of the NRAEF Salute to Excellence, an annual event that brought more than 800 of the industry's most influential and inspiring individuals together to support NRAEF's programs (e.g., the ProStart program and the NRAEF Scholarship Program). The purpose of the Salute to Excellence is to recognize the achievements of outstanding students and educators. (Note: The NRAEF Salute to Excellence national program has now been adopted and runs at the State Restaurant Association level).

A key component of the NRAEF annual Salute to Excellence event is the annual "Michael E. Hurst Lifetime Achievement in Education Award" established **"to honor the devotion to educating and enhancing the lives of young people that characterized Michael E. Hurst - a respected and successful restaurant operator and**



firm advocate of industry education - the NRAEF awards the Michael E. Hurst Lifetime of Achievement in Education Award to an outstanding educator who has made an indelible contribution to restaurant and foodservice education” (NRAEF publications).

Mike’s commitment to education began early in his career, when working as Executive Vice President of Win Schuler’s restaurants in Marshall, Michigan. Despite long days running the Schuler restaurants, Mike found time to travel over an hour each way to East Lansing to teach accounting at Michigan State University, as well as to teach a class in the School of Hotel and Restaurant Management.

This passion for education continued when he came back to Fort Lauderdale in the early 1970s. As he was establishing his first business here (Marina Bay Hotel and Club, and the New River Storehouse restaurant), he became a founding faculty member of the FIU Chaplin School of Hospitality & Tourism Management, one of the highest rated hospitality and tourism programs in the United States (ranked among the Top 10 Hospitality Schools in the World, ranked number 1 Hospitality School in Florida and ranked number 1 Best Value in the US).

In 1996, combining his business acumen and a vision for sharing industry leaders’ successes with future industry leaders at FIU, Mike created the **Distinguished Hospitality Leaders Lecture Series**. Mike personally invited and brought to FIU 65 distinguished hospitality executives, including graduates of the School. Hospitality luminaries such as Chefs Paul Prudhomme, Graham Kerr, and John Folse; hotel executives Jonathan Tisch and John Russell; and restaurateurs Norman Brinker, Herman Cain, Ralph Brennan, and Michael Kaufman have been among those who have come to share their professional journeys with FIU students. As a tribute to Professor Hurst, this endowed lecture series, named in his honor, continues to provide an occasion to create a bridge between the school and the hospitality industry. <https://hospitality.fiu.edu/lecture-series/>. Most recently (Feb 2021) the series featured Reginald G. Washington (FIU’74, CEO of Hojeij Branded Foods and Past President of NRA) and Valerie Ferguson (Regional General Manager, Deluxe Resorts at Walt Disney World), both past students and mentees of Mike Hurst. They have also created an endowment fund: The Professor Michael E. Hurst Distinguished Hospitality Leaders and Scholars Endowment supporting both the lecture series as well as a scholarship for qualified foodservice students (Michael E. Hurst Scholars).

Mike was a faculty member and professor in the FIU Chaplin School from its inception until he retired from FIU in 1999. According to FIU, “before his retirement at the end of the spring 1999 semester, 27 years after he gave his first lecture, this distinguished restaurateur, industry leader, and popular educator had taught more than 6,000 FIU students” from across the United States and international locations.

On a more personal, direct level, Mike was mentor to hundreds of employees working in his businesses. He made a point to hire as many high school students as possible, with an estimated reach of >600 local Fort Lauderdale students over the almost 30 years he operated his club, hotel and restaurants in Fort Lauderdale. Always willing to coach the students on career discussions, help with college applications, and provide employment for any returning student during college breaks, his purpose was to facilitate the continuing education of the students – in any field – and he took particular delight in the success of the graduates. He was always willing to provide a reference, particularly for students who wanted to advance their career in the foodservice or culinary arts, with a number of his 15th Street Fisheries employees going on to the Culinary Institute of America (CIA) in Hyde Park, New York, and becoming successful restaurateurs in their own right (e.g., Chef Peter Bouloukis, CIA ’83, The Restaurant People, Peter Blohme, CIA ’86, Chef /Owner Double P Hospitality consortium of restaurants).

QUALITY OF LIFE FOR OUR CITIZENS / FOSTERING THE SPIRIT OF OUR COMMUNITY

Family snow parties – complete with mountains of snow and sledding for the kids – in 1970s Fort Lauderdale? Evel Knievel stunt jumps, 12-foot New Year’s Eve champagne fountains, elephants at happy hour, bugs on the menu (for dinner!), fish flying through the restaurant to be sauteed tableside? The Oklahoma University band marching (and playing!) through the restaurant (well, they happened to be in town for the Orange Bowl, so why



not?)?! Tarpon feeding on the Lauderdale Marina dock every day at 5 pm for a show even the seagulls and pelicans showed up for...just a few of the hundreds of 'gimmicks' Mike employed at Marina Bay / New River Storehouse and 15th Street Fisheries to get people talking. To get the tourists talking..to their friends, their families – from wherever they were from, all over the country, all over the world – about Fort Lauderdale and the unique experience that they had while they were visiting. Mike's belief in the spirit of hospitality..and the value of word-of-mouth advertising was evident in everything he did. His philosophy personified that:

The Philosophy of Michael Hurst

- ⇒ Manage your restaurant from the front door, not the rear entrance.
- ⇒ Greet customers by name; make a game of remembering names.
- ⇒ Give customers the free gifts they cherish most: recognition, recommendation, reassurance.
- ⇒ As customers enter, let the smell of hot bread warm their expectations.
- ⇒ Serve them samples as soon as they are seated.
- ⇒ Keep servers at their stations. Use runners to bring food from the kitchen.
- ⇒ Make "Serve Hot Foods Hot" an art, not just an empty slogan. (*NOTE: there is not one of his students who could not recite this at the mere mention of Mike Hurst's*).
- ⇒ Serve salads ice cold and slaughter your competition.
- ⇒ If you don't want to slaughter your competition, invite them to dinner-but serve them cold salad.
- ⇒ Involve employees in taste tests long before you put a new item on the menu. Start them talking.
- ⇒ Involve customers in taste tests shortly before you put a new item on the menu. Start them talking.
- ⇒ To start people talking, tell them secrets about new recipes, new dishes.
- ⇒ Secret-telling is the world's best generator of word-of-mouth advertising. Word-of-mouth advertising is responsible for 85% of a successful dining room's patronage.
- ⇒ In addition to sharing secrets with your employees and customers, generate talk (word-of-mouth advertising) with surprises.
- ⇒ Bring in the elephants. The pajama games. The Oklahoma Marching bands.
- ⇒ Hospitality is a happening. BRING IN THE PEOPLE!

CIVIC RESPONSIBILITY / MAKING FT. LAUD A PLACE TO LIVE WORK OR PLAY

Mike Hurst believed strongly in not just contributing, but actively participating in developing the future of the community in which he lived. During his time in the 1960s in Marshall, Michigan, while he was the Executive Vice President of Win Schuler's Restaurants, Inc. (1969 revenue approx. \$5.5M), Mike found the time to:

- Serve as Chairman of Hospitality Business for the State Chamber of Commerce for Michigan,
- Serve as President , Community Chamber of Commerce for Marshall, Michigan,
- Serve as Regional Chairman for Michigan Week,
- Serve as President of the Nottawa Trails Boy Scout Council,
- Serve as President of the Midwest College Recruiting Association
- Serve as Board Member of the Chamber of Commerce and the Michigan Restaurant Association and
- Serve as Co-Chairman of the Michigan Restaurant Association's Government Affairs Committee.

Mike continued his track record of civic / community engagement when he moved his growing family of seven to Fort Lauderdale in the early 1970s. Despite a full agenda building and operating a large scale, new business in Fort Lauderdale (Marina Bay Club/New River Storehouse restaurant) and building / operating 15th Street Fisheries restaurant, Mike was:

- A member of Governor Bob Graham's Tourism Advisory Council for the State of Florida,



- A Founding Member of the Broward County Tourist Development Council (@1980)
- Instrumental in the planning of the Broward County Civic Center, with the express purpose of attracting business conventions to the greater Fort Lauderdale area (current day 'civic center' in the Broward Convention Center)
- Chairman of the Second Summer Festival (early 1980s), a Naval celebration (pre-cursor to what we now know as Fleet Week in Fort Lauderdale)
- Director, Florida Restaurant Association
- Professor at the FIU Chaplin School (as cited above)
- Personally ran (literally from the front door) the New River Storehouse and 15th Street Fisheries restaurants (est. total revenue 1973 – 2001 @\$140M to the Fort Lauderdale economy)

Mike has been described by his colleagues in the industry, by his students, and by his employees as: A “foodservice innovator”; a “Hospitality industry marketing genius”; as “having genuine passion for the industry, its people and its future”; as a “tireless educator and community advocate”; as “not only talking the talk, but leading by example - at the front door - greeting customers – by name”...and that’s just the tip of the iceberg.

Mike Hurst’s legacy spans almost 5 decades and continues to this day. He has directly and indirectly influenced an estimated +10,000 students in Hospitality Management (across MSU, NRAEF, and FIU) that have gone on to work in and/or operate hotels and restaurants locally and nationally (e.g. Reginald G. Washington (FIU’74, CEO of Hojeij Branded Foods and Past President of NRA); Tim Petrillo (FIU’94), co-founder/CEO The Restaurant People (TRP website); Debbie Banks, Owner, Vice President Lago Mar Hotel and Club; Kirk Ruoff, Founder and CEO of Turning Point restaurants headquartered in Eatontown, NJ), just to name a few of the hundreds of successful foodservice leaders influencing the industry today.

His impact on the Hospitality Industry is unparalleled. Not only did Mike earn accolades and awards while he was alive, his lifetime of contributions has also been recognized by President George Bush, House Representative E. Clay Shaw, and U.S. Senator Bob Graham, in addition to numerous hospitality leaders.



Mr. SHAW. Mr. Speaker, I rise today to honor the memory of Michael Hurst, who passed away on March 22, 2001.

Michael Hurst was president of 15th Street Fisheries, a restaurant in Fort Lauderdale. Mike was a cornerstone in the Fort Lauderdale community and, as his representative in Congress, I was impressed by his tireless enthusiasm for promoting education in the restaurant industry.

Many times Mike opened the doors at 15th Street Fisheries to give to others in need and to show them what hospitality truly was. He was not only a professor at Florida International University, he brought the classroom into his restaurant. Wherever he was he took the opportunity to tell others about his passion for education and the restaurant industry.

Mike was a regular visitor throughout the years to my office in Washington, D.C. It was evident that he had an unwavering commitment to the industry, and his "We're Glad You're Here" button is a positive reminder of his excitement for restaurant issues.

Mike was a remarkable leader and it was my privilege to serve as his representative. He combined business acumen with compassion and energy to ensure that those in the restaurant industry have educational opportunities. His many contributions will remain with us in Florida's 22nd congressional district and across the nation.



The current owner of 15th Street Fisheries, Mike's long time business partner and friend, Ted Drum (Shipyard, LLC), continues his legacy by operating the 15th Street Fisheries in the spirit that Mike embodied. In fact, when Mike passed away, Ted, representing the Shipyard, LLC, requested first right of refusal from the Hurst Family to buy the 15th Street Fisheries restaurant. While the family considered other offers to purchase the business, they agreed selling Fisheries to Ted Drum and the Shipyard LLC would be the best option to continue Mike Hurst's legacy of bringing hospitality to both Fort Lauderdale locals and tourists alike...and it has.

Mike Hurst died last night, at home with family members. Mike had been ill for a relatively short time. We will miss him greatly. He was a great friend and mentor to many, and one of the most creative restaurant operators in the world. His great sense of humor has contributed to all who knew him. Mike has owned and operated the Fisheries for almost 25 years.

Mike grew up in Fort Lauderdale, and began working in restaurants on Las Olas Boulevard, as a teenager. He never left the restaurant business. After college graduation, he operated restaurants in California, to include the President of "Don the Beachcomber". He returned to South Florida in the early 1970's to own and operate the Marina Bay Hotel and Restaurant. Mike was a tenured professor in the Hotel and Restaurant School at Florida International University for 25 years. Mike was active in the National Association of Restaurant Owners for many years. He was the National President several years ago, and most recently President to the National Restaurant Association Education Division. A number of the outstanding restaurant owners in Florida, either trained at the Fisheries, or were taught by Mike at FIU. Most recently Mike was notified that he won the coveted "Silver Plate Award", presented by the National Association of Restaurant Owners, to restaurant owners who have contributed the most to the Association. Everyone was also thrilled, when a few months ago, the Sun Sentinel Reader's Choice chose the 15th Street Fisheries the "Favorite Restaurant" in Broward County. Mike and Fisheries have won almost every award possible in the restaurant business, take a look on the wall of the restaurant, to see the numerous awards given over the years.

The family has requested that no flowers be sent. However, we will let you know the arrangements, when they have been made final. To honor Mike's memory, the marina flag will remain at half mast until Monday.

Mike is survived by his wife, Lorraine, five children, and numerous grandchildren. Mike's son, Andy, will now run the Fisheries, with the help of long time senior staff members, most with over 20 years experience at the Fisheries. Mike's legacy of his good nature, his quick wit, and kindness to all, will surely continue influencing and motivating all who knew him for their rest of their life. To Mike : **"WE ARE GLAD YOU WERE HERE !!!"**

Mike moved to downtown Fort Lauderdale (SE 2nd Street) at the age of 13. His mother, Jean D. Hurst, a widowed mother of two boys (Mike and his younger brother, Bill) ran a boarding house for travelers coming to the Fort Lauderdale area for business (the Log House operated on NE 2nd Street until Jean's death in 1979). Mike attended St. Anthony Catholic School, graduating from Central Catholic High School (now St. Thomas Aquinas) in 1949.

He left Florida for college (Michigan State University) earning a bachelor's degree in restaurant management in 1953 and a master's degree in accounting in 1954. After graduation, Mike left for the Army (Quartermaster Corps., United States Army, 1954-1956), then settled for a short time in Chevy Chase, MD (working for Marriott Corporation and also attending classes in business administration at American University) before moving back to Michigan @1960. There he continued building his career in the hospitality industry as Executive Vice President of Win Schuler Restaurants, Inc..

Mike returned to Fort Lauderdale in 1972 with his family to develop and operate one of the first social clubs in Fort Lauderdale, Marina Bay Hotel and Club (floating hotel on houseboats), and the New River Storehouse Restaurant with two business 'silent' partners (Alfred Bloomingdale and Bill McComas). In 1979, he opened 15th Street Fisheries, and traded his share of the Marina Bay partnership for the full ownership/operation of the 15th Street Fisheries, which he personally operated until the day he died in March 2001.

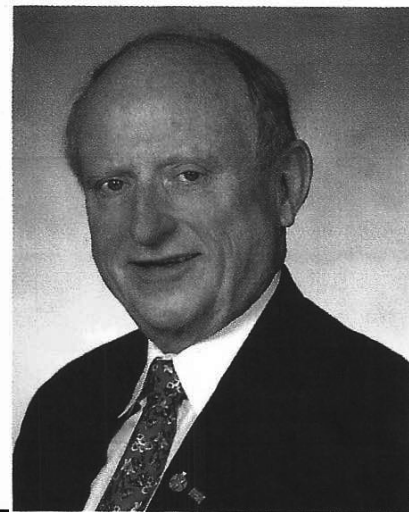

To date, approximately 26,000 brochures and 11,000 gun locks have been given away.

Historians of modern American architecture of the mid-20th century characterize him as one of the modern architects with unique, more productive, technically innovative and imaginative designs of the time. With its license registered in 10 U.S. states, McKirahan designs almost all types: affordable and exclusive single-family residences, gas stations, public buildings, elementary schools, offices, shopping centers and doctors, restaurants, banks, hospitals, temples, automotive dealerships, golf and entertainment clubs, motels and hotels that transcend nearby counties: Miami-Dade, Miami, Tampa, Palm Beach; ten U.S. states have been able to do so. USA; until internationalization: Bahamas, Jamaica, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Mexico, Honduras, Costa Rica, Brazil, and Ecuador.

- Making Fort Lauderdale a place to live, work, or play

In Broward County, prominent real estate firm Coral Ridge Properties hired McKirahan to design hundreds of single-family homes from prototypes and low- and high-rise apartment buildings, starting thus an immense and productive body of works. Even today, it is enough to be located at any point in the city of Fort Lauderdale and you can point in many directions to the hundreds of houses, apartments and cooperatives he designed.

McKirahan buildings with, or in the process of obtaining, Heritage Registration status: Charles Foster McKirahan Neighborhood in Vermont; Atlantic Bond Offices; Times Square Shopping Center; Blue Water Hotel; Manhattan Tower Hotel; Polynesian Restaurant Mai Kai; Bay Harbor Club Condos; Bay Harbor Continental; Birch Tower and Birch House; Hotel Quito in Quito Ecuador. With the exceptions noted, all of the other projects are in Fort Lauderdale and Broward County.

McKirahan was a larger than life figure.

His architecture firm, headquartered in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, was active for only 11 years, being dismantled after its tragic disappearance in 1964 when it was 44 years old. However, that decade was enough time to create an impressive body of work that led him from being an architect who started with small residential works to become a project designer in 10 American States and 9 other countries.

In 1962 The Miami Herald stated that McKirahan's office was among the 100 highest-income architectural firms in the United States. On his death, McKirahan was "Florida's highest-paid architect and one of the best known." Its office had 104 people and satellite offices in the Bahamas, Brazil and Chicago.

Fort Lauderdale lamented his accidental death as a city-wide duel. He was the pride of his adopted city and was so popular that his obituary indicated "McKirahan died". You didn't even need to write your profession or full name.

It was McKirahan.

His portentous work makes McKirahan one of the biggest representatives of a regional period that has come to be known Miami Modern or MiMo, the southern Florida regional variation of the postwar Modern era. As the region's response to the International Style it was often characterized by the employment utilitarian elements made whimsical, of buildings and interiors as glamorous movie set backdrops, all in the service of a cult of fun in the subtropics. It's high time the over 6-foot-tall redhead Charles McKirahan be inducted into the pantheon of esteemed South Florida mid-century architects that includes Morris Lapidus, Igor Polevitzky, Alfred Browning Parker, Robert Hansen, Bill Bigoney, and a host of others.

His architectural firm, headquartered in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, was active for only 11 years, being dismantled after his tragic death in 1964 at 44 years old. However, that decade was enough time to create an impressive body of work that led him from being an architect who started with small residential works to become a project designer in 10 American states and 9 countries.

In 1962 The Miami Herald realized that McKirahan's office was among the 100 highest-income architectural firms in the United States. On his death, McKirahan was "Florida's highest-paid architect and one of the best known." Its office had 104 people and satellite offices in the Bahamas, Brazil and Chicago.

His passing was lamented city-wide. He was the pride of his adopted city and was so popular that his obituary simply indicated "McKirahan died".

Under Kelvin's leadership, Broward County Library (BCL) is going places it has never been before! BCL is now offering library services by air, land and sea to people who live, work, study or play in Fort Lauderdale. This includes the new FLLibrary, a one-of-a-kind library "lounge" in the Fort Lauderdale Hollywood International Airport that lets travelers access and stream free movies, music and TV. Opened in 2019, it provides a welcoming respite for travelers, offering visitors to our airport and city a taste of the tech-savvy, forward-focused services we enjoy in Fort Lauderdale. On land, anyone riding a local transit bus or visiting select parks can now access free music they can download and keep, while guests at select local businesses, health-care facilities and government offices can use "Pop-Up" libraries to download free eBooks – no library card needed. Free library services at sea will soon be available to cruise ship employees through a pilot program launching this year at Port Everglades.

Kelvin has also enhanced library services that enhance the city's quality of life by encouraging and catering to entrepreneurs and small businesses. A native of Saint Louis, MO, Watson has developed an interesting reimagining of libraries that shatters the rigid concept of "library as a place" and replaces it with library holding digital space.

"I am not only interested in bringing people in the library," Watson told me, "But I want to bring the library out to people."

This is his vision for Broward County. As the former Chief Operating Officer and Senior Vice President for Queens Library in New York City, a library system that serves millions, Watson is passionate about the idea of easy access digital libraries. Through the incorporation of innovation and new technologies, "the library" has the opportunity to reestablish itself as a much needed community pillar.

Under his leadership, the Broward County libraries system has already begun the transformation. Online digital library card applications are quickly replacing the antiquated paper application. Tablets are being distributed to local libraries in preparation for a tablet loaning initiative. Digital content is expanding rapidly. As a personal nod to his years of service in the Army, Watson has also led the creation of the Veterans Connect Hotspot program, a free mobile internet service for Veterans and Active Military. Already within his first three months, Watson has set the trajectory for a revolutionized library experience in Broward County.

In addition to modernization, Watson also aims to expand Broward's libraries reach through the establishment of strategic partnerships with the county's important institutions, particularly Broward County Public Schools.

"We want to support our schools and build stronger relationships," Watson explained, "We would like to be a trusted resource for students, teachers, and administrators."

As one of very few African Americans in the profession, Watson feels honored to follow in the footsteps of his mentor Samuel Morrison, former Director of the Broward County Library System. With a passion for teaching and educating, Watson considers his new position as a mixture of personal passions and servant leadership within the Black community.

"There are not many African American men embarking upon this career path," Watson said, "But I see it as an opportunity to be a role model."

Watson admits he has not established special projects directed towards Broward's Black community, but emphasized the new partnerships and initiatives will have a direct impact on the county's most marginalized communities.

"My job is to serve everybody," Watson said, "I will leave special initiatives in those communities to the branch managers who are doing a great job and have a more intimate knowledge of community needs. But I am going to these places and I am meeting with the community and asking them what they want from Broward's libraries."



Broward County Library Pilot Tackles Digital Divide

As part of an effort to bridge the digital divide, [Broward County Library](#)(BCL), FL, in partnership with T-Mobile, the county's [Enterprise Technology Services](#) division, [CareerSource Broward](#), and the School Board of Broward County, has launched a two-year pilot program that will provide 300 tablet computers and data access plans to eligible residents of the [Broward Municipal Services District](#) (BMSD). Broward County Mayor Barbara Sharief requested the development of the pilot, noting that many families do not have sufficient income to afford computer equipment or Internet access, and that this poses barriers to education and, ultimately, income growth. "For some families in our community, it is more important to put dinner on the table than to have Internet access," she said. "But studies show conclusively that a lack of access to the digital world can adversely affect income and level of education achieved. It's important for every family to be able to connect to the same information

resources that many of us take for granted." Targeting households with incomes less than \$36,273 that include K–12 students, the program aims to connect BMSD residents with online resources available through BCL, CareerSource Broward, and other local institutions. T-Mobile will donate the tablets, valued at \$115,000, and the county will invest \$93,600 to fund the data access plans for the duration of the program. At the conclusion of the two-year pilot, the program's success will be evaluated in hopes of continuing it, according to a press announcement. The timing is opportune. Kelvin Watson, former COO and senior VP of Queens Library, NY (QL), just took the reins as BCL's new director on February 26. Although the pilot began taking shape prior to his appointment, the project's contours are similar to a successful tablet lending program that Watson launched in Queens, beginning with a pilot test in 2013. "We're going to follow a similar model," at BCL, Watson told *LJ*. Unlike QL, Broward does not currently have plans to design a custom interface for the tablets, and many of the details are still being finalized. But, similar to the program in Queens, BCL will preload the tablets with a curated selection of apps and other content. In addition, "we plan on tying the tablets to library programming," encouraging program participants to make regular visits to their local branch, Watson said. Mobile device management (MDM) software will be used to configure and maintain the devices, and possibly to restrict what types of additional apps and content can be downloaded onto them. MDM can also remotely lock tablets that are not returned on time or are reported lost. Rather than publicizing the program to patrons, BCL will work with the schools to identify students and families that meet the program's eligibility requirements, Watson said. BMSD "is a low-income area. We only have 300 [tablets] but there are going to be a lot of people who fit the criteria—the audience that we are trying to reach," he explained. Participants will be required to attend an orientation to learn the basics of using the tablets. Although the checkout period has not yet been finalized, Watson said that terms ranging from six months to an entire school year were under consideration. These relatively lengthy checkout terms are expected to help families and students to become more familiar with the tablets and online resources over time. "The goal is to provide continued access to these resources to help improve digital literacy," Watson said. "Our motto in the BMSD is 'Investing in our future, improving our community,' and that is exactly what the Digital Divide program helps us do," Sharief said in an announcement.

In this sponsored interview, we talk to a librarian intent on "inviting the uninvited"

After Kelvin Watson’s family finished watching the 1984 miniseries *Master of the Game*, the St. Louis, Missouri, native marched right to the nearest library, checked out the Sydney Sheldon novel it was based on, and read that 400-page book cover to cover. He was 8 years old.

“I felt very accomplished. That thing was bigger than me!” says Watson, who vividly remembers the experience 42 years later. “Reading that book made me recognize that what you check out from the library can transport you to the places you read about—I was *transported* to the diamond mines of Africa—and it didn’t deter me from checking out other books after that.”

Watson remained a voracious reader through middle school, college, and officer training. He served as a commissioned officer in the Army and worked in leadership roles in sales and marketing, for Ingram Book Group and Borders Group, Inc., before pivoting to a decorated career in public library service. Eighteen months ago, he transitioned from director of e-content services and strategy at Queens Library in New York City to the highest administrative position

at the 11th-largest public library in the nation: director of Broward County Libraries in southern Florida.

“The theme we’ve embraced over the past year and a half is ‘inviting the uninvited,’ ” says Watson, who is one of two recently named directors at large of the Public Library Association. “The greatest value we can give the community is continuing to launch initiatives for everybody, even those who can’t, for whatever reason, make it to our physical locations.

“What that has meant to Broward County is turning the library into a place that is both physical and digital,” he says of the 36-branch system, which serves approximately 1.9 million Floridians. “Most people are now equipped with a cellphone, so, essentially, the library is wherever you want the library to be.”

This fall the library can be found at 10 new Broward County locations—including a coffee shop, a health care center, and the Pompano Beach City Hall—courtesy of Pop Up Library, a pilot program forged in partnership with Baker & Taylor, a Charlotte-based distributor of books and entertainment. The system is one of the first in the nation to offer full access to its e-book collection, via Baker & Taylor’s Axis 360 platform, through a device that functions like a hotspot and doesn’t require additional staff to run.

Just plug in Pop Up Library and “you immediately are able to gain access to our Axis 360 database of e-books, and you can start getting access to those library materials without the need for a library card,” Watson says. “It’s mobile, so we can choose and move the locations. The way I envision it, we now have 10 new [digital] locations to add to the number of [brick-and-mortar] locations we have. We’re bringing more awareness of the library and extending our reach in the community.”

Broward County is already experiencing great success with a similar program launched last year: Community Share provides e-collection access to students in Broward County Public Schools, allowing them to view library resources during the school day, right at their desks, with digital library cards the key to a kingdom of knowledge. 30,000 students are registered, and they’re already looking to expand the program, which has the added benefit of strengthening the relationship between the library and school district, Watson says.

“Baker & Taylor are excellent partners for us because they continue to innovate,” he says. “It’s good to have partners that are adapting to our changing needs and the needs of the communities

we serve. They're always responsive, willing to hear from the customers, willing to listen to their



customers, and I appreciate that.”

Always striving with an eye toward the next accomplishment, Watson and his team have big plans to bring Broward County customers the maximum value a modern library can provide, no matter who—or where—they are.

“As a library system, we’re constantly evolving, we’re adapting,” Watson says. “That’s what the library has to do, just like any other organization or company that serves the public.

“We’ve done projects like working with our buses,” he says, “advertising the library and also connecting people to our electronic resources on the bus, because the buses are equipped with Wi-Fi. We did a similar thing with our parks. It’s always warm here in South Florida, so we have a lot of those outside gyms. We launched a pilot last fall for people to connect to music while they walk the trails or exercise.

“You have to stay relevant,” he says. “There are so many other things that people could be doing versus going to the library. I’m trying to make sure they’re always coming back.”

Will begin serving three-year term in late June 2018

BROWARD COUNTY, FL – Broward County Libraries Division Director Kelvin Watson has been elected as one of two new directors-at-large of the Public Libraries Association (PLA). His three-year term will begin immediately after the American Library Association's 2018 Annual Conference, which takes place in New Orleans from June 21-26, 2018.

"It is an honor to have been selected by my peers to serve as one of the PLA's directors-at-large," says Watson. "I'm looking forward to working within the PLA to further explore ways to expand the reach of libraries in the communities they serve and to broaden access to the vast educational, technological, and recreational resources and services public libraries provide."

Watson was named Director of Broward County Libraries Division in February 2017. Since then he has led ambitious and innovative initiatives that have made the Library a force in bridging the community's digital divide and strengthened the Library's connection to the communities it serves.

His initiatives include the Veterans Connect Program, which provides free portable Internet service to veterans, active-duty military, and their dependents as well as events and outreach targeted specifically to veterans; the "Your ID Is Your Key" service that makes digital library cards available to all Broward County public school students; and the launch of the GoChip, a device preloaded with a season of a premiere TV show that customers can check out. He's also overseen the launch of the Library's new "Reach Out, Reach Up!" program to assist formerly incarcerated

individuals in reintegrating into society by offering participants services that provide job readiness training, technology skills, literacy, and educational programs.

Additionally, Watson spearheaded partnerships that offer access to Broward County Library's collection of free downloadable and streaming music to Broward County Transit bus riders and visitors to Broward County parks and forged a collaborative partnership with T-Mobile that provides underserved members of the community with technological access and training that increase educational and vocational opportunities. Under his leadership, the library's collection management system has been decentralized and staff at all 38 locations are now empowered to select materials that best serve their communities.

Throughout his career he has remained active and involved in professional associations and, in addition to recent election to the PLA Board of Directors, is currently the immediate past President of the Black Caucus of the American Library Association. Watson is a frequent speaker and panelist at conferences and the recipient of numerous awards; including the 2017 DEMCO/ALA Black Caucus Award for Excellence in Librarianship. He has worked tirelessly to evolve the library's role in the community as "the inviter of the uninvited."

Watson is one of six PLA directors-at-large serving on the PLA Board of Directors, and the first director-at-large from Broward County.

The PLA, which is headquartered in Chicago, is the largest association dedicated to supporting the unique and evolving needs of public library professionals. Founded in 1944, PLA serves nearly 9,000 members in public libraries large and small in communities across the United States and Canada, with a growing presence around the world. PLA strives to help its members shape the essential institution of public libraries by serving as an indispensable ally for public library leaders.

This library offers online books, videos and music for free — no matter where you live

You now can download a bestselling book, a hit song or a video at no charge. A **plan to make people feel welcome in Broward** has opened up the county's online library collections to the world.

The free access is available to anyone who logs onto the county's website at broward.org/Library and applies for an Instant eCard.

Access is also offered to airline passengers passing through Fort Lauderdale-Hollywood International Airport and to people using county parks, who can scan a Quick Response (QR) code to apply for an online library access card and immediately begin making downloads.

The online cards are offered to anyone who lives, works or attends school in Broward County, or who is just visiting the county or who was born in the county. But they are set up so anyone can take advantage of them.

“I’d like to see as many people reading from anywhere in the world as possible. Anybody who’s reading, who’s coming through Broward, is a benefit to us,” Commissioner **Michael Udine** said. **“I have no problem if we’re subsidizing a small amount, somebody who’s reading a book who is not from Broward County.”**

Once an application is made, the library quickly sends an email with a library card number and pin, which allows users to connect to a variety of online services paid for by the county. Mobile users can also download free apps for the different services to make it easier to access those collections.

Some of the online resources are:

- OverDrive, which provides eBooks, eAudiobooks and videos, and includes New York Times best sellers.
- Freegal, a music service that allows cardholders to download up to six free songs a week — and keep them forever. Unlimited streaming of music also is possible.
- Hoopla, which has movies, music, eAudiobooks, eBooks, comics and TV shows that can be streamed or downloaded.
- Axix 360, which has eBooks for children and young adults.
- RBdigital Magazines, which includes hundreds of popular publications.
- Rosetta Stone, which can be used to learn foreign languages.

“Another reason we’re doing this is not just to provide a service to visitors, it also raises awareness of what libraries offer,” library spokesman **Stephen Grubb** said.

A cost to taxpayers

Rita Lipof, a library worker, said the open-access policy is not fair to county taxpayers, who are footing the bill for the nonresidents using the collections. It means longer wait lists for the most popular books, forcing the county to buy more copies to meet the demand, she said, and it gives nonresidents access to other music, books and videos that the county pays a fee per download.

“I do not think it is the goal of Broward County Library to provide online resources for non-Broward County residents,” Lipof told county commissioners. **“It’s great if you’re at the airport and you’re coming from another place and now you can get all these free eBooks, but it also would be great if we handed out \$20 bills. People would like that, too.”**

Some of the online services charge the county an annual fee, while others charge by the download. OverDrive costs the county \$1.2 million annually, Freegal \$170,000 and Hoopla \$230,000, officials said.

Palm Beach and Miami-Dade counties don’t offer any similar nonresident access to their online collections, officials with those programs said. **Nonresidents can purchase regular library cards that are good at each county’s libraries and online. Palm Beach County’s cost \$95 for a year or \$55 for a half year, while Miami-Dade’s costs \$65 for a year.**

Leila Khalil, a Miami-Dade library spokeswoman, said most nonresidents can access free digital services through the library systems where they live.

Growing popular

There is a rising demand in Broward for the digital resources. The library **system’s total** digital circulation went from 1.75 million in the first 10 months

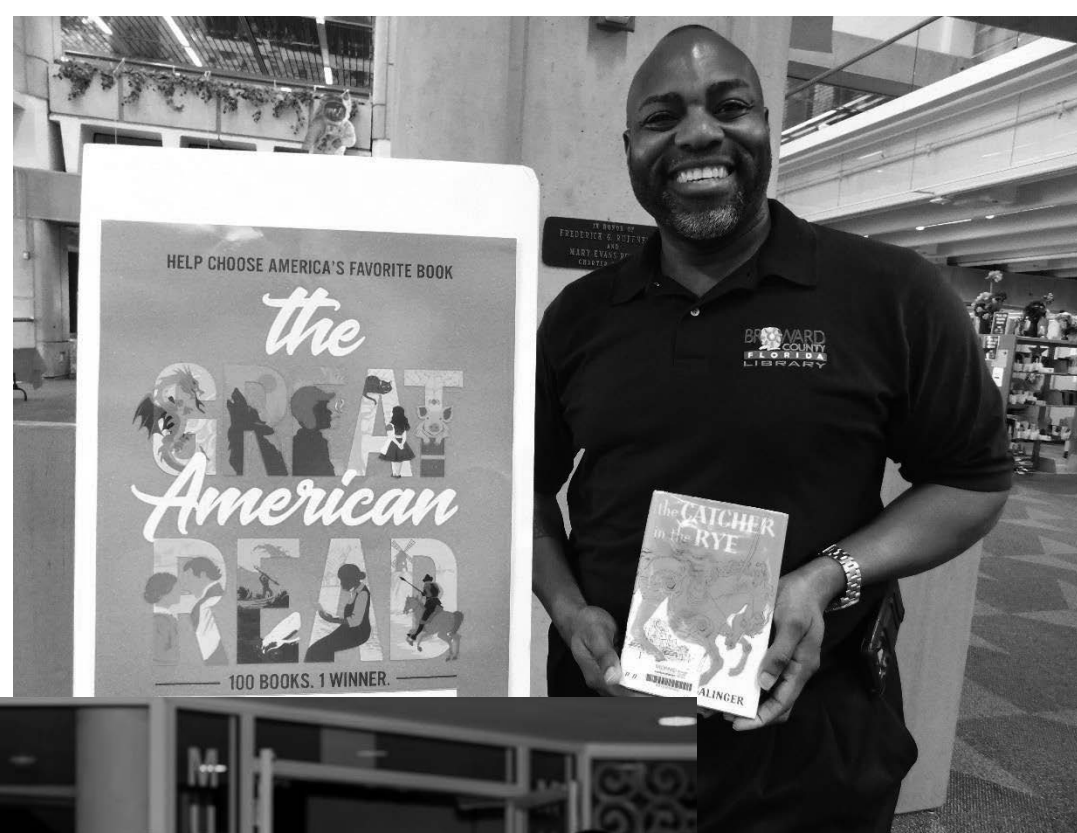
of Fiscal Year 2018 to 2.12 million for the first 10 months of Fiscal Year 2019, a 22 percent increase.

So far, Broward County officials aren't worried that nonresidents will bankrupt its online programs. Nonresidents make up only a small portion of all cardholders, said Broward Library Division Director Kelvin Watson. Any increase in wait lists for the most popular items is due more to the rising number of county residents having library cards than to outsiders, he said.

In the past three years, nonresidents made up only 10 percent of the eCards issued, or 5,796 of 56,978, officials said. The nonresident portion drops to 2 percent when you include the 205,974 Broward residents who have received regular library cards that can also be used to access the online services.

Advertisement

County Administrator Bertha Henry said the county will gather more statistics about the program so it can gauge the impact out-of-county residents are having on **the system. "It's expected that we're going to have people who do** not live here access those readers, but it was just one more addition to how do **we make our visitors feel welcome," Henry said.**
